Survey Methodology



TargetSmart designed and administered this multi-modal survey. The survey reached 497 adults, age 18 or older, who indicated they were registered to vote in Washington. The survey was conducted December 28, 2022 - January 4, 2023, online via a link from a direct SMS and through Dynata's web panel and matched back to the voter file.

The online sample was randomly selected from TargetSmart's enhanced voter file. Seventy-one percent of respondents completed the survey online and were reached via a SMS (68 percent weighted). Twenty-nine percent of respondents were recruited from Dynata's web panel and matched to TargetSmart's voter file (32 percent weighted).

Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic distribution of **registered voters** in **Washington**. The data were weighted by gender, age, race on file, TargetSmart. Partisan Score, TargetSmart Midterm General Turnout Score, TargetSmart High School Only Score, self-reported 2020 presidential vote, and region by congressional district to ensure an accurate reflection of the population.

Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding. The credibility interval (the theoretical margin of error for a blended methodology poll that relies partially on telephone-based probability sampling, and partially on non-probability based online panel sampling) is +/- 4.4%.




Key Findings

- A majority of Washington voters say individuals with more than \$1 billion in net worth are not paying what they owe in taxes.
- Two-thirds of Washington voters support implementing a wealth tax where the first \$250 million is exempt.

- Specific policies to raise taxes on the wealthy also find broad popularity in Washington.
- Washington voters name public health care, affordable housing, and K-12 public education as the top priority areas for funding with revenues from new taxes on the wealthy.



Majorities of Washingtonians think taxes on those with more than \$50 million and \$1 billion in net worth are too low




Q.10 Do you think taxes in Washington are too high, too low, or about right for the following groups of people?

Cross-partisan support for tax on wealthy










